SafetyNet-

The safety theme for November is *Seat Belts and Airbags* which provided data regarding how lives have been saved and injuries reduced by the use of safety belts. The safety theme was very timely as we completed eight defensive driving classes since September 2015, training 186 students

The Claim Corner provided an article Workers' Compensation Claim Information which gave instruction for how districts use managed care with Qual-Lynx for first reports and Jordan Reses for prescription drugs.

NJSIGtrain provided the article OSHA Embraces Lower Standards to Assist Whistleblowers to the membership. Whistleblower claims fall under the Conscientious Employee Protection (CEPA) act.

Safety Award winners were named in the SafetyNet and honored during the Atlantic City Year End Review. We also listed the November and December Train-the-Trainer class dates. The SafetyNet is included with this report.

Property Inspection Software

The Loss Control Department is collaborating with the Information Technology (IT) Department to improve NJSIG property inspection software. After exploring all options, the most cost effect solution was to build an in-house product to meet our specific property inspection requirements.

Seat Belts & Air Bags

Seat belts save lives! Seat belts are the single most effective safety device in vehicles today. The National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) estimates that seat belts save more than 11,000 lives each year, and reduce the risk of fatality and serious injury by 50 percent when used by drivers and front-seat passengers.

Air bags save lives! The NHTSA also estimates that since the introduction of air bags in 1984, they have contributed to savings more than 10,000 lives.

The combination of an air bag in addition to a lap and shoulder seat belt system reduces the risk of serious head injury by 81 percent compared to a 60 percent reduction for seat belts alone.

Below are a few important safety tips for riding in vehicles with air bags:

- Infants should NEVER ride in the front seat of a vehicle with passenger side air bags.
- ⇒ Children ages 12 and under should always be restrained in a child safety seat or a safety belt and should always ride in the back seat.
- Safety belts (both lap and shoulder) should be used with air bags.

Claims Investigation



The primary role of the Workers' Compensation Claims

Department is to assure that only legitimate claims are paid. Many times when a claim is called in there is a reason we place the claim under investigation. An investigation is not a denial but rather a delay in rendering a decision on compensability. Additional information is needed. Internal Incident Reports are a critical piece of information that we obtain from the districts. We recommend all districts complete an incident report noting what happened, the body part injured and the employee's signature.

We will inquire as to whether surveillance cameras were in the area of the incident. Surveillance video is very helpful in determining whether an accident actually occurred. Occasionally a claim might happen before or after hours. An investigation into whether the employee had permission to be in the building or the reason they were at the school, if they were within the course and scope of the employee's job duties are all aspects of our investigation.

Communication between the district and NJSIG is critical when investigating a claim. We are here to answer any questions or concerns you might have concerning a claim and we welcome your input. Down the Road

When was the last time you looked at your car's headlights? Sure, you look with them all the time, but as automotive safety tools, they

tend to be taken for granted. We keep tabs on oil levels, tire wear and even windshield cleanliness, or at least we should, but we usually don't notice our headlights until one burns out.

At that point, of course, you have literally half of your nighttime visibility until you

can get things fixed, which might be days or even weeks.



will improve visibility, reduce eyestrain and improve your overall confidence while driving at night. One option - the Sylvania Silver Star UL-

TRA is a halogen replacement bulb that is the brightest downroad headlight. More downroad visibility and whiter light helps increase the clarity and contrast of objects on or near the road.

While you're having your bulbs changed, make sure your mechanic confirms that

your headlights are aimed properly; highway knocks and bumps can cause your headlights' aim and alignment to gradually suffer. Also, check to see how clear your lenses are, as exposure to sunlight can cause plastic to yellow over time, diminishing the amount and quality of light that's making it through.

To make sure your visibility is not comprised, buy a headlight restoration kit at any automotive supply store. With just a little bit of time and elbow grease, your headlights will look almost as clear and transparent as the day the car left the dealer. As with all these changes, you'll see better and feel a whole lot better.
